
The first one dollar bill was issued in 1862 to help finance the Civil War. The portrait of George Washington and other design elements that we recognize today were added in 1929.


Switzerland celebrates one of its artists on every bill.




Your task is to replace the "dead presidents" with great Americans – civil rights leaders,



visual and performing artists,




scientists,
